FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends,

When I think of Hospitality House, I not only think of the youth in the neighborhood, I think of the importance of families. I know what it is like to face heartbreak at home. At the age of 6 my mother went home to be with the Lord. It was rough. I was blessed to have a good father and wonderful siblings. **And it was at Hospitality House that I was introduced to Jesus.** I heard the good news and because of the seeds that were planted at Hospitality House, the path of my life was changed completely.

On the north side our children face many challenges such as: educational disparity, poverty, drugs, gangs, crime, violence ... hopelessness. **It hurts my heart to see our children suffering and it causes me to want to do even more to help the kids and families.**

In 2007 I came to Hospitality House to volunteer in a program formerly called "Midnight Basketball", now named "Hoops After Dark", where the gym is open on Friday night so that young men can come in off the streets to play pick-up basketball, enjoy a meal together and hear some words of encouragement called a "power talk." At the time many of these teens were struggling not only because of the environment that they were born into but also due to wrong choices that they had begun to make for themselves. From this experience I found that it is more advantageous to begin helping kids at a young age while continuing to walk with them through their adolescent years. **I am excited about what we are doing in our Urban Learning Center and Athletic program to help our youth but my heart longs to do more.** I am looking forward to creating new programming dedicated to our teens. How much we can do will depend on you. About 90% of our revenue comes from donors like you whose hearts are moved to take action.

Please join me in coming alongside the youth of today, to help them become the leaders of integrity tomorrow!



OUR PROGRAMS



EDUCATION

Hospitality House's Urban Learning Center (ULC) **provides intensive academic support in a caring environment that builds self-esteem and confidence.**

Through licensed teachers, one-on-one volunteers and community partnerships, the ULC program serves K-12th grade students primarily from low-income families in North Minneapolis by developing reading, math, and life skills.

Educational Programs Offered:

- After School Program
- Summer Spot
- Teen Program



ATHLETICS

Athletics provide a healthy free-time activity and motivation to stay in school. Hospitality House **teaches skills in ball handling, health, and fitness, while promoting integrity, teamwork and excellence.**

Boys and girls have fun competing on teams while learning skills for life.

URBAN LEARNING CENTER

AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAM

The Urban Learning Center (ULC) After School Program is a comprehensive program that offers Kindergarten through 12th grade students structured academics with a focus on Language Arts, Math, Science, and Social Emotional Skills. The program is open every Monday through Friday, 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. during the Minneapolis Public School's school year.

Students had an average increase of 43% in reading and 146% in math.

While attending ULC students receive homework help, a snack, a meal, and two hours of structured

classroom instruction. **Licensed teachers and education assistants work with students on grade level appropriate lessons and materials that correlate with Minnesota standards.**

An Individualized Continuous Learning Plan (CLP) is developed for each student. Classes are kept small, with a maximum of 22 students per teacher. Smart TVs, laptops, and tablets provide access to state-of-the-art technology for all students.

On Fridays, students take it easy and have crafts, experiments, and movies. **Every day, students spend time studying the Bible and learning about God.**

There is also plenty of free time for students to relax, play some basketball, hang out with friends, or test their skills on a selection of educational games in the computer lab.

TEEN PILOT PROGRAM

Our goal is to see teens on track to graduate high school and be prepared for post secondary education.

In the summer program, teens took practice **ACT tests**, went on visits to various **colleges** and the Best Buy Tech Center, served at **Feed My Starving Children**, and partnered with **Senior Community Services** (lawn mowing), **Junior Achievement** (financial training), & **Step Up** (City of Minneapolis work program). Students also enjoyed trips to horse ranches and **Valleyfair**.



HOOPS AFTER DARK

One of Hospitality House's longest running programs now has a new name! **Hoops After Dark** is held every **Friday evening from 7 to 10 pm** and is open to inner city males ages 13-18. This weekly event is an energizing alternative to a night on the street and offers **friendship** and **hope** where there often has been little.

Summer Spot is the name of our Summer Day Camp program. Students come to Hospitality House over the summer Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Daily activities include structured lesson time, free time, field trips, and meals. The program is designed to **eliminate the "Summer Slide"**. Students had an average increase of 42% in math and 13% in reading from the beginning to the end of the Summer Spot program.

ATHLETICS

Athletics have always been a cornerstone of what we do here at Hospitality House. **Giving students positive things to do during their free time** not only keeps them off the streets and out of trouble, but builds their self-esteem, teaches valuable life lessons, and instructs them how to play sports fairly and competitively.

BASKETBALL

In 2018, 13 teams represented Hospitality House in the Minneapolis Park Board League and traveling teams. The teams are very competitive. 124 athletes were involved in basketball programs.

The **Hospitality House fifth-grade girls basketball team** competed in the Mid America Youth Basketball (MAYB) National Tournament in August, 2018. The girls traveled down to Oklahoma City, OK for the weekend tournament and came home **National Champions!**

BASEBALL



Playing baseball at Hospitality House is as old as Hospitality House itself! In 1960, our founder, Woody Larson, would go to North Minneapolis parks and start pickup games with kids from the community. This year 47 athletes on four different teams participated in baseball through HHYD.

INNER CITY TENNIS



Through a partnership with Inner City Tennis (ICT) and their Northside Community Initiative, ICT has provided programming and education to our students. Their Outreach team delivers the Kidspeed® curriculum covering tennis, nutrition and life skills.

COMMUNITY

Christmas With Dignity, created in 1993, gives parents the pleasure of shopping and giving their children new gifts at prices they can afford. Parents pay just 10% of the retail price for gifts. **This lifts some of the financial burden off the parents while giving them the dignity of providing for their children.**

Open each year for one day in December, the Christmas store at **Hospitality House** served **402 families, providing gifts to 1061 children.** Gifts of toys and clothing are donated by corporations, individuals and churches. We are grateful for the many who support this heart warming event and to Slumberland Stores which offer drop off sites in the Twin Cities.



FAMILIES

Community: Hospitality House is a place where families can come together as a community committed to support one another.

Training: Hospitality House provides educational opportunities for the whole family to learn and grow together.

Referrals: Hospitality House makes every effort to connect the families we serve with the resources they need to thrive as families.

OUR IMPACT

Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me...Psalm 23

"Kalem" is a wonderful young man I met about a year ago and sometimes he follows me around. I had not seen him for a while so when he showed up, I gave him a big hand shake and spent some time finding out how he was. He looked at me and said "Your hair is turning grey" - quite observant for a second grader. Teasing I said, "No it is not. Your glasses must be getting dirty". He loves to banter so we had a great discussion. **He is surely full of goodness - and a few other things.**

Kalem, like many inner city kids, is beginning to struggle in the academic area. He is already about a ½ grade behind. **In North Minneapolis the graduation rates are improving but the competency rates in math and reading are not.** It takes time and energy to grow your academic skills. Sometimes attitudes get in the way. Sometimes family issues, violence, gangs, or a combination of things do. For sure many children are overwhelmed and need help. Programs at Hospitality House find many kids will do okay till about 3rd grade. **Kalem is reaching an age that will have a critical impact on the rest of his life.**

We find Kalem and students like him respond well to one on one time and mentoring. They very much need someone to encourage them, to help them when they begin to struggle with 2 digit subtraction and reading. **If they have someone to follow, someone to take their hand, someone willing to invest in their young lives – that can make all the difference in the world.** If interested in making a major impact in a young person's life by spending 1 hour a week at Hospitality House, please contact our volunteer coordinator, Sarah Fischer 612-522-4485

I've known Derek for over 3 years and have noticed that he has become a sensitive and positive leader. In fact he came into my current class of 3rd Graders and testified to the fact that the adults at Hospitality House know what they're talking about and that the **students** need to listen. Furthermore, he **also shared how he** has changed because of the ways the staff at HHYD has loved him and shown him a better way. It was a moment where I was able to stand back and see something **come** full circle. Ultimately, I am encouraged by Derek. He is a joy to know, he brings a spark of **life** to those around him. **I'm looking forward to see how God uses his spark to inspire others!**

Goal 2: Teens - To create a new program dedicated to teens.


- To improve academic achievement of students so that they graduate from High School.

Goal 3: Families - To establish a comprehensive family program.


- To partner with families so that their children will experience support and success.





A Note from our Board Chair

Dear Friends,

Inspired and guided by our Christian focus, it is our vision to see at-risk youth equipped to become leaders of integrity, broken families restored and the North Minneapolis community rebuilt. We are indebted to you, our partners, in helping to improve the quality of life and providing opportunities for youth and families of this Northside community.

Education remains a key focus for students to become productive members of the community. It has been noted that children "*learn to read until grade 3; then they read to learn*". I am happy to report the children enrolled are making great strides in reading and math and we are positioned well with quality staff, well thought-out programs and appropriate structures for future growth. In 2018:

We served 309 students; 178 after-school and 131 summer.

Our after-school test results show a percentage increase of 146% in math pre/post test scores and 43% increase in reading pre/post scores.

Summer test results show improvement in pre/post test scores of 42% in math and 13% in reading during our six weeks of summer school.

Team **athletics** are another key focus of the development of children. Athletics are important to develop life skills of teamwork and character. This year we had 17 Athletic teams with 171 athletes (124 basketball and 47 baseball) and we continue our partnership with Inner City Tennis which allows youth to receive tennis lessons at Hospitality House in the fall, spring and summer.

Our **family events** have grown from quarterly activities to a monthly event. These events include such things as Christmas with Dignity (402 families purchase new gifts for 1061 children at 10% cost), Senior/Grandparent Night, and Black History Night.

In an effort to bridge the gap between area police and this **community**, we hold an event called "Building Bridges through Basketball." Police officers play a friendly basketball game against our Hospitality House youth.

The Future - Teen Program. In 2017 the Board of Directors made a strategic decision to expand our programs to more intentionally and aggressively come along side our teens, during the years when they are most at-risk. This year we piloted aspects of our Teen Leadership program which will help mentor our teenagers through the high school years and into college and beyond. We recognize the difficulties; but capitalizing on the relationships we've built with our K-8 kids and their families, we are in the best position to now add the structure and staffing needed to help our teens become leaders in the community.

I am personally grateful for the staff, Board, volunteers and donors. I have volunteered at Hospitality House since 2001 and today I am more enthused than ever to see the difference we make in the lives of children and families. We are all looking forward to continuing to serve the Northside families.
